Folk Art Exhibition and Competition at Conventions this year.

Genealogy Workshop April 12, 9am-3pm

Greg Holter will conduct a Norwegian Genealogy Class/Workshop on Saturday, April 12, in the Fireside Room at Kennewick First Lutheran Church. A \$30 fee for the class will include a light lunch, as well as coffee during the workshop. The proceeds from the class go to the Sol-Land Lodge general fund.

The workshop will be 6 hours, from 9 AM to 3 PM. The first 1.5 - 2 hours or so are presentation and lecture, and the rest is time to work on individual questions that participants bring, to demonstrate the use of the available resources. Greg will use a laptop and projector so everyone can follow along with these "consultations" and learn from them.

We will limit class size to no more than 18 people, which helps to make sure Greg can work with as many people as possible for a little while on their specific problems.

While some of the material is focused on general genealogy, there is a strong focus on the particulars of Norwegian genealogy. (There are a number of people who can address the general genealogy stuff, but fewer that can address the specifics of Norwegian genealogy.)

Greg will bring along examples of resources (like bygdeboks and maps, etc.) and some ways of displaying family history information, so people will be able to see these firsthand. And then we will also address resources available through the Internet, most of which are accessible free of charge.

The agenda will include two basic parts: a talk/presentation to begin, and then live demonstration of the resources using problems and questions people bring along with them.

The agenda for the talk includes the following elements:

- Basic problems in genealogy
- Norwegian naming structures and patterns
- Norwegian social structure
- Some basic vocabulary
- Where to look for genealogical information
- Objectives and search strategies
- Recording results



Greg includes personal examples and anecdotes in the course of the discussion. He also has some strong personal biases, and is not afraid to inflict those on the participants.

The working session will include live demonstration of how to use key resources that were introduced during the talk/presentation.

There will be a handout outlining some of the most important of the resources.

Greg got involved in genealogy in the late 1990s, and most of the class is based on what he learned doing genealogy for his family and his wife's family. He has also helped a number of others in the U.S., Canada, and even Norway with their genealogy. Greg has been doing things like this workshop for various Sons of Norway lodges and at other events for over 10 years.

Genealogy is a great way for people to connect with their origins, and with all of the resources that are available, Norwegian genealogy is highly accessible. But people need to know **WHAT** to look for and **WHERE** to look.

Fiskesuppe (Fish Chowder)

Authentic Norwegian Cooking, Astrid Karlsen Scott

4 large stalks celery	¼ cup butter
½ cup of salt pork	2 Tablespoons white flour
1 medium onion	2 c. milk
Fish or vegetable broth	
1-½ cups fish meat (firm white fish, cod)	
Chopped chives, optional	

Here is one of the soup recipes we taste tested at the February cooking class.

Clean and dice 4 large stalks of celery. Cook in a small amount of water until tender. Dice ½ cup of salt pork and fry gently, but well. Dice one medium onion. Make cream sauce. Dilute the cream sauce with fish or vegetable broth, resulting in a rather thick sauce. Then add celery and the water in which it was cooked, the fried salt pork and diced onion. The final addition is 1-1 ½ cups fish meat. Cook gently for 30 minutes. When serving, sprinkle individual serving bowls with fresh chopped chives. Serves 4-6.

Cream Sauce: Melt ¼ cup of butter, add 2 heaping tablespoons of white flour and blend. Dilute gradually with 2 c. of milk until desired thickness. Simmer 7-8 minutes. Season to taste.
